BURZIO.

A pair of finely cast and chiselled Louis XV ormolou twin-branch wall-lights, attributed to Jacques Caffiéri (1678-1755), possibly after designs by J.A. Meissonnier (1693-1750).

Each with scrolled molded asymmetric backplate cast with flowerheads to the base, the scrolled arms pierced with C-scrolls and cast with berried leaves and flowerheads, with acanthus scrolled drip-pans and nozzles, rethreaded.

The elaborate design of this pair of wall-lights, with coiling stem and branches, makes it a significant illustration of the Rocaille era creations. The nozzles and the drip-pans, the foliate and the scrolls, all different, demonstrate the vitality of Louis XV's style. The exceptional quality of the chasing enhanced by the mercury gilding, turn this pair of wall-lights into a beautiful example of the luminaire productions in mid-18th century, close to the production of Jacques Caffiéri.
